

May this addition to your garden serve as a reminder of our thanks and appreciation for six years of leadership. You have given so generously of your time and talents to advance



the programs and spirit of the West Trenton Garden Club. You have exhibited the qualities of leadership and dedication so vital to the mission of our club. We challenge you to continue to serve our club, the incoming Corresponding Secretary, our current officers and the board with your experience and enthusiasm. May your days be filled with beautiful flowers, special memories and gardening friends.

This evening, as the West Trenton Garden Club celebrates its annual installation ceremony, we

honor our current officers and our new officer. We also celebrate all of you, our Garden Club members. who generously share your unique qualities and talents. Diversity, creativity and willingness to grow together are the traits that make the West Trenton Garden Club an outstanding organization.

Tonight's installation theme is based on selected native plants highlighting their unique and informative aspects. Each native has a personality all their own. They set root, reach to the light, attract pollinators and curious

gardeners. Pay close attention, as interesting secrets about each plant has been laced throughout this presentation.

In gathering the plants for this evening, I thought about what each plant was saying to me. I looked at their names, puzzled over their shape, smelled their leaves and reached into my memory bank, conjuring thoughts of seed catalogs, flower shows and wildflower meadows. At the end of the day each plant illustrated their unique qualities enlightening me to showcase them this evening, I share their secrets. Get ready to listen to the story they tell.

### Now I invite our current officers and our newly elected Corresponding Secretary to step forward.

Our first native plant is Liatris spicata commonly known as blazing star or gay feather. It is a striking herbaceous perennial native to the eastern United States. It has frilly purple/lavender flower spikes. What is unique is that the flowers bloom from the top downward unlike most plants. Blazing Star blooms from mid to late summer and into fall, offering a crucial nectar source for pollinators when many other flowers have finished blooming. It supports birds such as goldfinch that feast on the seeds in late fall and winter providing a valuable

food source. In our club the Blazing Star represents the Corresponding Secretary. The attributes of kindness and acknowledgment are needed in this role. The unique trait of this flower that blooms from the top downward represents the ability to present kind and positive words from the very top of your correspondence to its conclusion, with final words of true care. Your duties will include writing cards and letters and taking care of the

club's correspondence. Vickie, as you write your cards and letters, let your words provide nectar and nurturing good thoughts. May the vibrant Blazing Star be a source of joy that you share with others. Best wishes for a year of remembering.

Now we recognize are current leaders who continue to serve in the year ahead.

The next native plant is Asclepias tuberosa commonly known as Butterfly Weed. It produces bright orange flat top flower clusters in early June. The flowering goes on for many weeks. Green pods full of seeds with silky white hairs follow the flowers. Monarch butterfly caterpillars feed exclusively on milkweed plants. Without milkweed, Monarch caterpillars cannot survive. Butterfly weed is vital for the Monarchs life cycle. This plant signifies the duties of the Recording Secretary.

The minutes of each meeting are vital to the continuing cycle of our club. Karen, this past year, you documented the club's various actions and activities. You correctly recorded all that occurred. We thank you for keeping the vital records on track and in excellent order. Karen, I present you with the Butterfly Weed. Best wishes for a calm and thoughtful year.

The next Native plant highlighted is Zizia aurea commonly known as Golden Alexanders. This native is a powerhouse for pollinators, attracting a wide array of beneficial insects. It attracts various bees including specialist mining bees. It's early bloom time in late spring to early summer, provides a crucial nectar source when other plants may not yet be flowering. The attractive early blooms of bright flat topped clusters of tiny yellow flowers provide a cheerful splash of color, It is a vital host plant for the caterpillars of the black swallowtail butterfly. In our club Golden Alexanders symbolizes the Treasurer. The bright yellow flowers provide nectar just as our treasury provides resources for the club's many activities. Rick, this past year you collected and deposited money, wrote checks, gave monthly financial statements and worked on the

annual budget. We thank you for keeping the finances in sound order. Rick, I present you with the Golden Alexanders. Best wishes for a flourishing year.

The next native plant is Phlox paniculata commonly known as Garden Phlox. This native is a popular herbaceous perennial admired for its vibrant blooms and pleasant fragrance especially in mid to late summer and early fall. It



is a dearly loved traditional garden flower that is highly attractive to butterflies, hummingbirds and moths making them a valuable addition to many landscapes. One of the most significant benefits of garden Phlox is that they are very highly attractive to such a wide range of pollinators. This contributes to biodiversity in the garden and the surrounding environment. The Garden Phlox represents the Vice President who fosters the interaction between all members. Linda, you have faithfully chaired board meetings and worked

The final native plant this evening is Scutellaria 'Appalachian Blues' commonly known as Skullcap. The Appalachian Blues skullcap is a little known, but a wonderful landscape performer. It has deep green lustrous foliage and forms a spreading mound in the landscape in early summer. It is lined with bi-color purple and white skullcap flowers that bloom up to 8 weeks....simply a color machine! It attracts butterflies and native bumblebees in addition to being deer and rabbit resistant. Also heat and drought tolerant. Who could ask for more? The Appalachian Blue represents the President with a surprise combination of so many sought after attributes. Of course this plant is truly symbolic of the role of President. The traits shared with this plant include beauty, color, strength, health, uniqueness, productivity, heat and drought resistance Annie, you have faithfully presided at club meetings,

appointed committees and chairpersons, kept up on all club matters, statewide events and represented the West Trenton Garden Club. Annie, we thank you and we offer you our full support. # WTGC 2025-2026 Programs Preview

# Welcome back, everyone! We hope you are having a restful and healthy summer.

The Program Committee, chaired by Iliana Okum, met in June at her home to exchange ideas and plan interesting and informative programs for our upcoming meetings. After much discussion, we're excited to present a new direction for this year's programs.

Since our Flower Show has been postponed to September 2026, we're using this opportunity to introduce new members—and refresh our experienced ones—on how to create and design entries for the various Flower Show classes in horticulture and design. We know it can sometimes be difficult for new members to follow conversations about the Flower Show, its horticulture displays, design categories, and photography entries.

To help with this, we've invited several experienced presenters from New Jersey Garden Clubs, as well as some of our own members, to create demonstrations that correspond with specific design classes from the Flower Show. This year's theme will be: "Color Me Autumn." Thank you to Pat Bowker for her excellent work in creating a show schedule, which will be submitted for State Garden Club approval.

To highlight our theme throughout the year, we're inviting 3–4 members each month to show us what a specific horticulture or design class looks like in practice.

We'll kick things off on *August 4* with a special handson demonstration and practice session led by Ingrid Fair, one of our most talented designers. She will walk us through the steps of creating a traditional design in a small container. All members are asked to bring a container of their choice. (See the flyer next page.) In *September*, we'll focus on horticulture entries. Our speaker will explain how to display horticulture following National Garden Club (NGC) manual guidelines. Members are invited to bring in samples from their gardens—tree branches, shrubs, and other plants—to help everyone visualize what's needed for the 2026 show.

In *October*, we'll welcome a speaker who specializes in crafts. They will guide us in making a festive fall holiday mask.

In *November*, we are pleased to welcome back Deborah Pomroy. She'll review NGC guidelines for floral design and demonstrate both a standard design and a small-scale design arranged on a functional dinner table for two. Once again, 2–3 members will be asked to set up card tables with functional dinner arrangements.

During the *winter months*, we'll feature seasonal programs to help members plan their spring gardens.

Looking ahead to *May*, we're thrilled to welcome award-winning designer Pat Bowker. She'll demonstrate how to create petite designs in three Flower Show classes, ranging from 8 to 12 inches tall. We encourage members to bring their own petite designs for inclusion in a group display under the Tea Tray category.

We hope you'll enjoy and benefit from this year's presentations. Many thanks to the Program Committee for creating such an educational and engaging schedule. Special thanks to Anne Skalka, Lynn Grillo, Lorraine Persiani, Helga Fontus, Nancy Fontus, and Iliana Okum for chairing and hosting this summer's planning sessions.



Class 2 "Fall Festival"

(4 entries)

The start of fall festivals brings cooler brisk days filled with the colors of the season, enjoy all this time of year offers.

**A Design in the Manor of a Traditional Mass** – Not to exceed 8" in height, 8" in width, and 8" in depth. Staging panel and underlay provided by Committee (8"W x 8"D x 8"H), may be covered by designer. Staging PENDING. Designer's choice of plant material and other components. Viewed from the front. HB, p. 73.

Class 3 "Harvest Moon"

(4 entries)

This orange-red moon that occurs every September represents abundance, transformation, and a transition period.

**A Design (freedom of style)** – Not to exceed 12" in height, 12" in width, and 12" in depth. Staging panel and underlay provided by Committee (12"W x 12"D x 12"H), may be covered by designer. Staging PENDING. Designer's choice of plant material and other components. Viewed from the front. HB, p. 73.

#### SECTION B. "Sweater Weather"

Eligible for Designer's Choice Award

**Consultant:** 

Class 4 "Woodsy"

(4 entries)

The beauty of nature is calling, take a walk in the woods for inspiration.

**A Creative Design** – Staged on a table 29" from the floor, against a neutral wall. Space allotted 30"W x 30"D. Designer's choice of plant material and other components. Staging panel and underlay provided by the exhibitor required. Viewed from the front. HB, pp. 71-72.

Anticipated Show Dates - Sept 18-19, 2026

### Class 5 "The Pumpkin Patch"

(4 entries)

Pick your favorite color – we are not just pumpkins but stunning autumn gourds.

A Design (freedom of style and type) – using fresh and/or dried materials incorporating a pumpkin(s) and/or other gourd(s). If using a pumpkin/gourd as the container, it should be sealed to limit rotting. Design to be staged on a table 29" from the floor, against a neutral-colored wall. Space allotted 30"W x 30"D. Staging panel and underlay provided by the exhibitor required. Viewed from the front.

### Class 6 "Fall Cleanup"

(4 entries)

The best time of year for craft shows, yard sales and antiquing!

A Still Life Design\* – Staged on a table 29" from the floor, against a neutral wall. Space allotted 30"W x 30"D. Objects are more important to the theme than plant material. Plant material may or may not represent a floral design. Designer's choice of plant material and other components. Staging panel required; underlay permitted. Viewed from the front. HB, p. 76.

### SECTION C. "Special Gatherings for the Third Season of the Year"

Eligible for Table Artistry Award

#### **Consultant:**

#### Class 7 "Grateful Hearts Gather Here"

(4 entries)

As the fall season comes to an end, bring friends and family together for an American tradition – Thanksgiving.

A Functional Table Set for Two (Semi-formal) – Staged on a 36" square table, 30" from the floor staged in front of a neutral-colored curtained wall. A decorative unit suitable for the allotted space and a table overlay are required. Designer's choice of plant material and other components. Placemats or underlay permitted. Viewed from the front. HB, p. 76.

### Class 8 "Teatime in the Apple Orchard"

(4 entries)

What better way to spend a fall day, picking apples and enjoying cinnamon spiced tea! **A Functional Tray for One (Informal)** – Exhibitor to provide tray not to exceed 19"W x 16"D or 18" round. Staged on a quarter of a 70" round table 29" from floor. A decorative unit is required. Designer's choice of

plant material and other components. Viewed from the front. HB, p. 76.

#### Class 9 "Oktoberfest"


(4 entries)

**A Functional Table for One** (Informal) – Staged on a 30" round high-top cocktail table, 42" from the floor, in front of a neutral-colored wall. With a decorative unit suitable for the space allotted. Designer's choice of plant material and other components. Exhibitor to provide a table covering with a 12" minimum overhang. Viewed from the front. HB, p. 76-77.
