

WTGC History | Membership Through the Years

n the 1950s, membership in the West Trenton Garden Club was a very special privilege. In order to become a member of the club — you had to actually live in West Trenton! An official map was drawn up defining the boundaries of West Trenton. Even if you lived within the boundaries, membership was not a guarantee. You had to be officially sponsored by a member in good standing. Your name was placed on a waiting list. The number of members was limited. as meetings were held in fellow members' homes. That certainly presented space limitations! Members had responsibilities that had

was required to enter a Flower Show. If mandatory requirements were not met, you could forfeit your membership.

"25 YEARS OF FLOWERS AND FRIENDS"

In February, 1953, 13 ladies from the West Trenton area, adorned in hats and white gloves, met in the home of Louise Voorhees to form a club which is now known as "The West Trenton Garden Club" On Monday, February 13, 1978 (snow date, February 27), 60 members will meet to celebrate the 25th anniversary of that club. The co-chairmen will be Betty Shotwell and Mildred De Flesco. The committee will be as follows: Grace Starrett, Vera Preine, Linda Arbesman and Barbara Farenelli. Janet Hauber is the current president and Mari Epley and Margaret Nowalinski are the only remaining active charter members. This special celebration will be held in the Ewing Presbyterian Church hall on Scotch Road. Reception will be held in the Fireside Room at 6:30 p.m. and dinner will follow.

Today, the purpose of the West Trenton Garden Club remains the same—quote, to inform its members of gardening techniques, principles of flower arranging and to encourage civic improvement" unquote—but with a new concept—The ladies have discarded their hats and white gloves and are now doing the 'nitty-gritty'—such as the tremendous landscaping job on the West Trenton Firehouse grounds.

Eileen Clement was chairman of this project which was started in 1970. It was a familiar sight to see her at the firehouse at 6 o'clock in the morning and working all day until dark. This was carried through for 3 years. Memorial trees and shrubs were planted honoring loved ones—Tons of pachysandra were planted by her and other members of the club. Today, as you drive by, you will notice a flourishing Elue Atlas Cedar Tree, that makes an outstanding focal point. Eileen

In 1957, Kwansan Cherry Trees were sold to each club member. Today, these trees are 25 to 40 feet high and present a breath-taking spectacle when they bloom in the spring.

As the club grew, the meeting place was changed from members homes to the Mountain View Golf Clubhouse. Further expansion forced us to move again to the West Trenton Presbyterian Church hall. The club stages at least two flower shows each year in this building. These shows require extensive planning and the participation of every

member is mandatory.

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In 1962, Winifred Gamble, who was president at that time, founded a monthly newsletter, namely, "The Garden Path"----This is still being printed and Mary Jane Mechan is the current editor. This same year, the West Trehton Garden Club became a member of the Garden Club of New Jersey which is a member of the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc.

In March 1965. The West Trenton Garden Club participated in the Philadelphia Horticultural Society's annual floor show in Philadelphia. Madeline Youngs designed a 9x12 area as a Japanese Garden with a sculpture as a focal point. This fabulous array of blooming spring flowers was given an award.

In 1966, during Betty Shotwell's presidency, the West Trenton Garden Club was given a special invitation to stage a flower show in the sample apartment of the very exclusive, newly-built Lafayette House on West State Street in Trenton. The show was entitles, "A Garden of Hospitality and an arrangement was made to compliment the decor of each room, of the sample apartment. Eleanor Navarro did a prise-winning Williamsburg arrangement for the foyer and Winifred Gamble won an award for her arrangement of white daisies in an antique scales in the dining room. This display was open for three days to the public.

In 1974, Irene Berglund of the National State Bankk organised lip garden clubs to do flower arrangements for the Trenton Commons.

Mrs. Perlee Solon and her civic improvement committee asked Audrey

Harker of the West Trenton Garden Club, to be chairman of the flower shows. This entailed a great deal of co-ordinating but was so successful that the whole affair was televised.

For many years, members of the West Trenton Garden Club entered the National State Bank Christmas Flower Shows and won the highest awards. They also took part in the Broad St. Bank, Arnold Constable and Lit Brothers flower shows.

The club's only fund-raising project is the annual spring geranium sale which is supervised by Barbara Faranelli assisted by the members. Over 4000 plants are sold each year. This project also helps to beautify the community.

A beautification award is given each year to a local garage or business building for the most outstanding and attractive plantings of flowers and shrubs.

To commemorate the Bicentennial, Mari Epley, civic chairman, arranged for the club to present Sarvis Trees, which were George Washington's favorite tree, to every school in the West Trenton area-public, private or parochial. In the same year (1976), Audrey Harker, assisted by other club members, made a collage of New Jersey depicting the variety of cultural, historical, botanical and geographical aspects of New Jersey. Included were the 4 state symbols: the red oak, the violet, the goldfinch and the honey bee. This collage was presented to the Ewing Township Board of Education to be displayed in the various schools specified lengths of time.

Well known ornithologists have lectured at meetings of the West Trenton Garden Club educating the members on how and what to feed wild birds and where to place bird housed to encourage nesting---Hence, this area is known for its variety of wild birds.

One member, upon completion of a new home 20 years ago, learned by joining the W. T. G. C. how to landscape and transform an acre of yellow mud and shale into a botanical showplace. Two rules---Do not plant trees directly in front of your new home (with exception of one show tree) and allow at least 4 feet space between your home and the shrubbery. (This allows space to weed and wash windows.)

Twice a year, individual flower arrangements are made by members of the club for patients of the Fort Dix hospital. Also large arrangements are placed in the entrance room, recreation and dining area. Flower arrangements have been taken to Glen Gardner and Donnelly Memorial Hospitals. Mini flower gardens have been made in bird cages and hung outside wheel-chair height so patients can care for their individual little gardens each summer day.

The West Trenton Garden Club also sponsors a Junior Garden Club which is a separate entity. Their flower shows, however, are held in conjunction with the seniors. Marcia Felcone is the current chairman of this group. Senior members give workshops and talks to instruct the Juniors.

A biology award is presented to an outstanding student of Ewing High School annually.

Dogwood trees have been planted at two churches in memory of deceased members of our club.

Plantings have also been made at Rambling and Armstrong Pars in Buring Township.

Evergreens have been planted in front of the Municipal Building and on each aide of the stone World War II marker at Fisk School.

Dogwood trees were planted at Hwing High School and also a monetary contribution was given for plantings for a new courtyard at the school.

Participation in the annual 4th of July parade in Ewing Township has always been a "fun" event. In 1976, the club arranged a large float.

The West Trenton Garden Club is rated very highly in the community and fre qently some members are asked to judge other garden club flower shows. This is quite an honor. The following have all acted as judges for outside shows: Grace Starrett, Mari Epley, Amy Korn, Florence Good, Winifred Gamble, Vera Preine, Sylvia Forman, Lorraine Whitehouse, Madeline Youngs, Audrey Harker, Lucy Hartig snfl Margaret Nowalinski.

Grace Starrett also appears quite frequently on television, Ehannel 6 with the Captain Noah show. Margaret Nowalinski teaches flower arranging at the Adult School at Ewing High and Lewrenceville High.

So, being a member of the West Trenton Garden Club not only gives the pleasure of digging in God's earth in search of beauty and contentment, it enriches the lives of each one so they It also can reach out and share their knowledge in the community.
