Program | Easy Care Perennials for Your Garden

Jeffrey Van Pelt, February 2, 2026



We have all been in a garden center looking for plants when we see one that wins us over. After reading the glowing description on the tag we buy it, bring it home, and plant it, only to find that it wasn't suited for our growing conditions. We feel the pain as we watch our hopes and dreams slowly die. This lecture is designed to show case perennials that thrive in most garden conditions with little care. *Jeffrey Van Pelt* will be highlighting perennials that you may not know or have not considered as well as the garden workhorses.

Jeffrey Van Pelt was the long-time supervisor of horticulture for the Somerset County Park Commission, known for his expertise in roses and sustainable gardening, particularly at the Van Der Goot Rose Garden in Colonial Park. Though he has since retired from the position, he continues to share his knowledge through presentations.



Philadelphia Flower Show

February 28–March 8 at the Pennsylvania Convention Center

The 2026 PHS Philadelphia Flower Show will take place February 28–March 8 at the Pennsylvania Convention Center. Titled “Rooted: Origins of American Gardening,” the show was announced by the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society (PHS) on January 14 at the Union Trust building, commemorating the historic site of the first Philadelphia Flower Show in 1829.

This location honors the city’s role as the birthplace of America’s first Flower Show as the nation approaches its 250th anniversary. In the spirit of the 250th celebrations, this year’s Flower Show honors the people, places, and traditions that have shaped gardening, from cherished family memories to time-honored practices that continue to inspire today.

“Rooted: Origins of American Gardening’ reflects the heart of PHS’ mission connecting people and plants to transform lives and communities,” said Matt Rader, president of the PHS. “Every plant and garden tells a story. The Flower Show celebrates those stories while serving as a fundraiser to support PHS’s year-round work in the Philadelphia region to create green spaces, expand access to fresh food, and foster neighborhood resilience and community health. Just as gardens grow from strong roots, so does the impact we can have together in our community.”

The PHS will debut a reimagined layout supported by a new wayfinding framework that helps guests easily navigate the Show through five core experiences: SEE, SHOP, MAKE, LEARN, and PLAY. PHS will continue to utilize its primary exhibition spaces for the Show’s gardens, exhibits, and experiences. The Marketplace shopping destination will move to a new street-level home directly below the main exhibition space, giving vendors a highly visible location enhanced with floral moments and seating areas that invite guests to linger and explore.

WTGC Celebrates History at Drumthwacket Holiday Open House

This past December, the West Trenton Garden Club proudly participated in the annual Drumthwacket Holiday Open House, a beloved seasonal tradition at the New Jersey Governor's Mansion. Each year, member clubs of the Garden Club of New Jersey are invited to decorate the public rooms of the historic home, delighting visitors with creative displays that reflect both the beauty of the season and the heritage of our state.

This year's theme honored the upcoming 250th anniversary of the United States, and WTGC was selected to decorate the elegant Music Room with the theme "The Battle of Trenton."


The focal point of our design was a striking 4-foot replica of The Battle Monument, the iconic column in downtown Trenton marking the location of General George Washington's artillery during the pivotal 1776 battle. Surrounding this were carefully arranged vignettes that told the story of the event and the era.

The mantel was lined with thirteen tall candles, each symbolizing one of the original colonies. A historically inspired scene of the Hessian surrender, a map of the battle, and a pewter place setting evoked the setting of 18th-century Trenton. Completing the room was a Christmas tree adorned with handmade, natural ornaments, reminiscent of decorations used in the 1800s.

Guests enjoyed self-guided tours accompanied by live piano music in the Music Room, with docents on hand to share details about each display. WTGC's historically grounded and visually rich interpretation was well received by visitors, many of whom paused to take in the thoughtful craftsmanship.
